Welcome Home! We are so happy to welcome you to Kansas City, the largest city in the state of Missouri, and home to the United Federation of Doll Clubs, Inc. Museum and Central Office. Celebrated cultural traditions include Kansas City jazz; theater, as a center of the Vaudevillian Orpheum circuit in the 1920s; the Chiefs and Royals sports franchises; and famous cuisine based on Kansas City-style barbecue, strip steak, and craft breweries. Nicknamed the City of Fountains, you'll find more than 200 along with many other attractions to add to the enjoyment of your stay in this wonderful city. We have included tours of five museums in the Convention schedule for your enjoyment.

Our host hotel, the Kansas City Downtown Marriott, is just 30 minutes from Kansas City's International Airport, MCI. The more modern tower, the Marriott, will house all learning activities which include workshops, seminars, programs, the Competitive Exhibit, Annual Business Meeting, and meal events. The historic Muehlebach Tower will host our world-class UFDC Sales Room, the UFDC Boutique, Special Exhibits, the Helper room, the Mini Office and UFDC on-site office. The hotel staff are very excited about our Convention and are looking forward to taking care of us.

Your UFDC Convention team has worked hard to prepare a fun week packed with a diverse array of wonderful events. You may find it difficult to choose! Our Annual Business Meeting is the primary reason for the Convention. At this year's meeting, club delegates will vote on matters pertaining to the functioning of UFDC. Club Presidents will receive all the relevant information beforehand to share with their members and their delegate(s). Attendees will also be able to attend Regional Gatherings and the Open Forum.

In keeping with UFDC's mission, there is a fantastic array of learning events -Workshops, Seminars, the Competitive Exhibit (including Highlight Tours), Special Exhibits, Programs, Gatherings, and some special treats for our Junior Collectors.

If this is your first Convention or you have not been to one in a while, make sure to attend the Convention Orientation program on Monday afternoon. Make a note of all your questions and bring them along!

There will be LOTS of shopping opportunities in the world-class UFDC Sales Room and the UFDC Boutique. And on Public Day, be sure to check out the books on the Publisher's Preview tables.

The Convention is also a big fundraiser for UFDC and there will be several occasions when attendees will be able to show their appreciation by making a financial

contribution. UFDC's Fundraising Committee will be hosting three events during the week – the Welcome Gathering/Ice Cream Social on Monday night where attendees can reunite with friends; exciting bingo games (with prizes!) on Wednesday evening; and a relaxing movie on Saturday afternoon. All of them will be great fun and a terrific way to support the organization!

Several special ticketed meal events are being offered, including lunches, afternoon teas, and dinners where you will be able to enjoy delicious food, great programs, and receive a variety of wonderful souvenirs as mementos.

We top the week off with the Gala Banquet. Our souvenir doll artist, Helen Kish, has created a wonderful souvenir doll for us. "Miss Unity" was inspired by adding a new version to our existing Miss Unity that we have all loved dearly throughout UFDC history. Helen's version is a nod to the past but with inspiration for her future. Helen has created two fashions for Miss Unity, one in a traditional outfit, and, as a companion piece, she has created a complete change to carry us into our future years.

You are guaranteed to take away many happy memories from Kansas City as well as a few mementos, including the Convention Souvenir Journal, edited by UFDC Past President (and UFDC Historian) Loretta Nardone. Just make sure you send your event request form in by the deadline – you don't want to miss out on the fun!

CONVENTION INFORMATION

CONVENTION HOTEL

AIRPORT

Kansas City International Airport (MCI), is 19 miles to the north of downtown and the hotel.

TRANSPORTATION AIRPORT TO HOTEL

By Car/Taxi etc. 30 minutes. Shuttle service from the airport is provided by Uber, Lyft, RideKC or private transport service. RideKC bus is free and runs hourly at 10 until the hour. Pick up is at the Boardwalk and drop off is at Station B downtown Kansas City which is approximately four blocks from the hotel. Please consult the internet for private transportation information.

HOTEL PARKING

Self-parking is \$24 per day/part day from 8:00 AM Monday to 8:00 PM Friday. Valet overnight is \$42, less than 5 hrs. is \$30.

ACCESSIBILITY

The hotel has many features aimed at providing equal access for all guests. However, if you think you will need a scooter to enable you to fully enjoy the Convention, then contact Mobility City KC 816-282-6528 (Brad) for rental information.

SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS

For attendees who indicate special dietary needs on their Convention registration, alternative menu choices will be provided at all meal events including our banquet. Your Convention packet will include special colored meal tickets indicating your needs. ONLY those who indicated special needs meals will be able to receive substitutions at meal events. Please note that substitutions are made at the discretion of the hotel; UFDC does not control that.

PET POLICY

The Marriott is a pet friendly hotel and accepts dogs (only) regardless of their working status. The following is noted on the hotel website: *We ask that guests do not leave dogs alone in a guestroom. Two pets with 25 pounds max per room. There is a \$75 nonrefundable fee.*

REGISTRATION AND TICKET INFORMATION

Attendees should report to the UFDC Registration desk located on Level 2 after checking in to the hotel. See this booklet for registration times on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. Attendees will receive a registration packet with their name badge, ribbons, final schedule booklet, event tickets, tote bag and Souvenir Journal. A photo ID is required for Convention check in, but you only need your UFDC membership card for entrance to the Annual Business Meeting. You may not give or sell your event or banquet tickets to another person. Event tickets are not transferable. These tickets are marked with your name which enables UFDC to trace and protect your event favors and/or souvenir doll. Please do not post event tickets for sale or trade anywhere at the Convention.

SHIPPING

Our hotel does not have an onsite business center. We are working with them to secure packing and shipping services to be set up at the hotel. In the meantime, if you need to send anything to the hotel in advance of the Convention, packages will be accepted for registered guests up to 3 days prior to their arrival. The hotel will not accept or hold packages for recipients without a reservation. Packages should be addressed to: Kansas City Marriott Downtown Hotel, 200 W 12th St. Kansas City, MO 64105, Attn: (Vendor/ Contractor Name) Conference Name. Charges are \$5 per package or box less than 3 lbs, \$10 per box weighing over 3 lbs, \$25-35 for Booths and Trunks per box regardless of size/weight, with letters and FedEx or UPS Envelopes being complimentary. Abandoned materials will be discarded within three (3) business days.

EMPLOYMENT BOOTH & CONVENTION CHARMS

A special charm or tie tack is designed each year as a token of our appreciation for Convention volunteers. Three hours of work qualifies for one of these mementos. CONVENTION ACTIVITIES

UFDC EVENTS

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

The Annual Business Meeting will be held on Friday morning and is the primary reason for the Convention. Annual reports will be presented by the Officers of the corporation and club delegates will vote on matters pertaining to the

functioning of UFDC. All UFDC members are encouraged to attend. No other activities are scheduled to conflict. You MUST bring your UFDC membership card to attend the meeting. Voting delegates must be checked in no later than 8:30 AM to have voting privileges. If you forget your card, replacements will be available in the UFDC Mini Office.

REGIONAL GATHERINGS

Regional Gatherings are on Thursday afternoon. Not only do they provide attendees with the opportunity to discuss what's going on in their region, but it is a great way to meet people, make new friends and get to see and hear from your Regional Director up close and personal!

OPEN FORUM

The Open Forum is scheduled just after the Regional Gatherings on Thursday afternoon. It is your opportunity to ask questions and share feedback and comments with UFDC members and leadership.

LEARNING EVENTS

WORKSHOPS

Chair Nancy Percival has once again gathered a talented array of Workshop presenters! With 19 Workshops offered in 3-hour time blocks, each class has been selected to challenge the student to learn new skills or to entertain them by creating something special. If you sew for your doll, you'll be delighted at the list of offerings. If you like to craft items to go with your dolls, then you'll be excited to see there are Workshops for your taste as well. The complexity of each Workshop is noted in the detailed descriptions. To help you decide which ones to request, finished Workshop project photos are available for viewing on the UFDC website under the Convention tab. Workshops are ticketed events at an additional cost beyond Convention registration.

SEMINARS

ReAL Services offers attendees the opportunity to attend educational seminars. Organized by Chair Kate Reed, the 27 Seminars are ticketed events for small classes of in-depth study. Space is limited and there is a small fee. Seats not occupied 10 minutes after the published start time will be forfeited and sold to attendees waiting in line outside the Seminar rooms. No refunds are given to attendees who do not check in on time. Use the request form included in your Convention packet to sign up. Seminars typically last about 3 hours.

COMPETITIVE EXHIBIT

One of the most rewarding and educational experiences of the Convention is participating in the Competitive Exhibit. Co-Chairs Sue Popp and Diane Vourderis have assembled 120 diverse categories which are listed in the Competitive Exhibit side of this booklet. In sharing their dolls, UFDC members provide one another with the greatest opportunity for doll study in the world! Please note that the deadline for entries is June 23, 2024.

COMPETITIVE EXHIBIT HIGHLIGHT TOURS

Organized by Chair Florie Hirsch, this is your opportunity to hear the judges explain the judging process. The tours are free, but the number of spaces is limited so you need to sign up for tickets in advance. Sign up is on Wednesday morning and the tours take place on Thursday morning.

SPECIAL EXHIBITS

Each year, Convention attendees look forward to enjoying a variety of Special Exhibits presented by our members and clubs. Exhibits are open to all attendees at no additional fee. Special Exhibits Chair Kathleen Allen looks forward to welcoming you to the five Special Exhibits in Kansas City.

PROGRAMS

Carol Cameron, Director of ReAL Services, has arranged 21 Programs, led by subject matter experts, on various doll topics. There is no additional fee for Programs and seating is available on a first come basis. Programs typically last about an hour.

GATHERINGS

Want to meet other collectors that share your interests in a specific type of doll? Chair Carol Cameron has organized fourteen Gatherings on Thursday and Friday evenings. UFDC provides space for these special interest and collector groups to gather. Everyone is welcome and no fee is charged. Available on a first come basis as space allows.

JUNIOR COLLECTORS

Junior Collectors will enjoy a great week courtesy of Junior Co-Coordinators Erica Cruz and Kim McIntyre-Bott. Juniors will also be very welcome at many of the other events during the week. A fun time is guaranteed!

SHOPPING OPPORTUNITIES

UFDC SALES ROOM

Each year, dealers from near and far travel to the UFDC Convention to display their vast array of wonderful dolls and accessories in our world-class Sales Room. This year, Co-Chairs Gail Lemmon and Fritzi Martinez have an exceptional line-up of dealers to delight attendees all week long. Whether your passion is for antique, vintage, or modern, there's sure to be something for everyone in the UFDC Sales Room located in the gorgeous Evergreen Ballroom.

UFDC BOUTIQUE

We will once again be locating the UFDC Boutique in a separate room. So come along to the Colonial Ballroom in the Muehlebach Tower, where you

will find great merchandise - dolls and accessories, convention souvenirs and amazing "Tender Loving Care" type bargains. Everything you buy from the UFDC Boutique supports our organization.

PUBLIC DAY/PUBLISHER'S PREVIEW

Public Day will be held following the Annual Business Meeting on Friday. This will enable members of the public, plus UFDC members who did not register for the Convention, to access the Sales Room. To add to the enjoyment, Publisher's Preview tables will be found just outside the Sales Room.

FUNDRAISING

Welcome Gathering/Ice Cream Social - There will be the usual Welcome Gathering/Ice Cream Social on Monday evening. As well as being a great opportunity to meet up with everyone, there will be a fundraising aspect to this, with donations being accepted for various Wizard of Oz memorabilia. So, bring cash, your check book and/or your plastic – we accept all forms of payment! We will also be launching the new Regular Giving program. So, plan to be there so you can hear all about it!

Adopt-A-Doll during the UFDC Museum Tours - Have you been thinking of adopting a doll in the UFDC museum but never got around to doing it? Well, now is your chance. During the tours to the UFDC Museum, if you see a doll that you would like to adopt, there will be people on hand to organize that for you!

Bingo Night – On Wednesday we are going to have a bingo evening. Whether you are a bingo expert or a novice, come along – it will be great fun, with wonderful doll prizes. This is a ticketed event, so make sure you enroll via the event request form. If it does not fill up, we will have tickets for sale at the door, but we think it will be very popular, so we suggest you book your place in advance! A big thank you to both the Sunshine Doll Club and the Gold Coast Doll Study Club from Region 9 for their very generous sponsorship of this event in memory of Margaret Vitale.

Wizard of Oz Film – Saturday afternoon, we will be showing a movie – yes, you guessed it – *The Wizard of Oz*. Although free of charge, we will be asking for donations to cover the cost of the license. It's a great way to sit back and relax after what will have been a VERY busy week, so make sure to mark it on your schedule.

HELPERS/SILENT AUCTIONS

UFDC members and clubs donate hundreds of items which help defray the costs of the Convention. The Helpers/Silent Auctions include all kinds of dolls, accessories, and doll-related items. Purchase tickets to drop into buckets for a chance to win or place a bid on your favorite items on the Silent Auctions table. Chairs Lorie Roller and Glenda Warren will be supervising the fun, along with the drawing to determine Helper winners on Saturday morning.

SPECIAL EVENTS

TICKETED MEAL EVENTS

Meal events feature a wonderful program, a delicious luncheon, afternoon tea, or dinner, and either an exclusive limited-edition doll created by one of UFDC's many talented artists or another limited-edition souvenir. Companion items are often available at an additional cost. In addition, new for this year is a special Wine and Hors D'oeuvres event, with a souvenir book. Space at these events is limited and only ticket holders will be admitted. See full descriptions in this booklet. The ticket price for these events is based on the combined cost of the event souvenir and the meal, and other costs such as the AV. Meal events are a key part of UFDC being able to meet our contractual food and beverage commitment to the hotel. A BIG thanks to the various clubs and groups who are hosting these events and too, the Meal Event Coordinator, Alisha Cole, who has worked with them to create what will no doubt be lots of memorable moments.

TOURS

There is sooooo much to see and do in and around Kansas City! We have organized five tours for you. You can find a list of them in this booklet, along with dates and times. Details of the tours, including prices, are on a separate sheet in your packet. And look in your tote bag for information on other places to go/things to do – we want you to make the most of your time here!

GALA BANQUET

Saturday's banquet is the grand finale of the Convention. Enjoy a delicious meal with doll friends, a fun video created by Kathy Monier capturing the highlights from our week at Convention, and this year we have special guests inviting attendees to the 2025 Convention. A highlight is the unveiling of this year's fantastic souvenir doll by Helen Kish – what a great way to end the week.

CONVENTION RULES

You may not lend your convention badge or ribbons to any other person for any reason. Allowing another person to use your badge or ribbons will result in the loss of your Convention privileges for the remainder of the Convention. If you lose your badge, ticket, or ribbon go to the UFDC Office for replacement.

You may not give or sell your tickets to another person. This is to protect your souvenirs. At the Gala Banquet, each table host will have a list of those assigned to their table. No others will be seated and tickets with written alterations will not be honored.

Children under 8 years of age are not permitted in any area of the Convention. Some restrictions apply to attendees under the age of 18. No infants or strollers are allowed in the Sales Room at any time. Registered children must be accompanied by an adult at all times.

You may not sell in your room during the Convention. Sales, by authorized dealers, are permitted only in the Sales Room, at the Publisher's Preview and in locations staffed by UFDC personnel.

Photography is allowed in the Competitive and Special Exhibits areas at all times EXCEPT DURING GRAND OPENINGS OF THESE EXHIBITS. Pictures may be used for commercial purposes only if they meet the stipulations of the "Exhibitor and Photographer Agreement." There is no photography allowed during programs including those given at meal events.

Images of people or items exhibited at any UFDC function, if used commercially, must include the following caption: "Photographed at the United Federation of Doll Clubs Inc. Annual Convention." All use of images must follow the "Exhibitor and Photographer Agreement." By registering for the Annual Convention, attendees agree that their image or images of items they exhibit at the Convention, may be used by UFDC without any additional recognition, fees, or compensation.

Cell Phones – please silence your phones during presentations or when visiting exhibits. If you must make or take a call, please leave the room.

Many thanks for abiding by these rules – they are there to keep everyone safe and secure.

Cancellation policy – Registrations are not transferable. If you are unable to attend the Convention you may:

- **A.** Cancel before May 15th and receive a refund of your fees minus the cancellation fee of \$50. Your Convention souvenir doll will be shipped to you if you have purchased one.
- **B.** Return your registration receipt to the UFDC Central Office, along with instructions to release your souvenirs and event favors to a specified person. This person must fill out a form at the UFDC Office for your items to be ready for pickup following the Saturday night banquet.
- **C.** Return your registration receipt to the UFDC Central Office with instructions to ship your souvenirs and event favors to you. They will be shipped by the end of September. Shipping charges will apply.

After May 15th, all registrations, including ticketed events are confirmed. No cancellations or refunds will be issued after this date. You will receive all souvenirs and event favors from ticketed events and workshops. Seminar tickets are non-refundable.

Japanese Friendship Dolls Alan Scott Pate

The Japanese Friendship Dolls of 1927 are arguably the most important group of dolls ever created. Designed as a diplomatic overture to help heal the growing rift between the US and Japan, these 58 large-scale ichimatsu dolls represented the height of Japanese doll artistry at that time. Their exchange, along with 12,739 "blue-eyed dolls" sent by the children of the US to the children of Japan, was an unprecedented gesture of friendship and goodwill and their ameliorating impact was felt immediately on both sides of the Pacific. This special exhibition, bringing together five of the Japanese Friendship Dolls, represents the largest gathering of these dolls in the US since the summer of 1928!! It is indeed a rare opportunity to meet some of these doll ambassadors face to face, to experience their beauty, and to learn something about their respective histories.

1949! Heirloom Doll Collectors Club of Kansas City

What was happening in 1949? Seven-inch 45 rpm records were introduced, Junior Mints made their debut, Harry Truman was sworn in as President of the United States, and the United Federation of Doll Clubs, Inc. was issued a Certificate of Incorporation. If a shopper in 1949 went into a toy store, department store, or ordered from a catalog, what beautiful dolls would they find? To celebrate the 75th Anniversary of UFDC, the Heirloom Doll Collector's Club has put together a delightful and informative exhibit of dolls made around that time.

Funko Pops Angel Eschler

Funko Pops first debuted at the 2010 San Diego Comic-Con with three different characters; Batman, Batgirl, Green Lantern, and one variant: Metallic Batman. Since then, Funko has acquired over 1,100 licenses that are broken down into 10 categories: ad icons, animation and cartoons, anime and manga, comics and superheroes, movies and TV, music, retro toys, Sci-Fi, sports, and video games. If you look closely, you might even see a few Funkos of your UFDC Board members in this Special Exhibit!

The Wiz in Doll Style Central Penn Doll Collectors Club of Region 13

The Wiz, Charlie Smalls' musical adaptation of *The Wizard of Oz*, opened on October 21, 1974, at the Morris A. Mechanic Theatre in Baltimore. *The Wiz* follows Kansas farm girl Dorothy who works to find her way home after being transported in a tornado to a magical land. The production featured music and lyrics by Smalls and a book by William F. Brown. The show was revived in 1984 starring Stephanie Mills as Dorothy once more. In 2015 *The Wiz Live* joined NBC's series of live musical events this time featuring 18-year-old newcomer Shanice Williams as Dorothy. This doll exhibit is designed to bring to light the beautiful artistry of the costumes and scenery of the original stage performance in all its glory...in "Doll" style.

Connie Lowe – An Extraordinary Artist Susan Rood

The program follows Connie Lowe's early life in relation to dolls and art. As a teen, she discovered her love of sculpting. Later in her adult life, she dressed and collected antique dolls then turned to sculpting dolls. Her dolls are now popular with many collectors.

The Dolls distributed by La Poupée Modèle Samy Odin

The French magazine La Poupée Modèle distributed dolls as early as 1863. Lili is the best known of them, the famous Poupée sold by Madame Lavallée Peronne. Other dolls followed such as Grand Bébé, Bébé n. 1, Mignon, Benjamin, Mignonnette, Benjamine... and, of course, their legendary paper dolls! Please join Samy Odin to discover the impressive variety of playthings related to this children's magazine.

Japanese Lions and Tiger and Bears, Oh My! Vickie Hannig

This program focuses on animal figures made in Japan, some of which were incorporated into tableaux with ningyo, (Japanese dolls), while others were created to parody humans or as stand-alone objects. Examples include keue saiko (thread dolls), ningyo performing the lion dance, and horses in musha ningyo displays. Some animal figures depict characters from folk tales. Examples will include figures from the presenter's collection of antique ningyo.


